

Woman Suffrage-Research in the Rhodes Collection Archives By Jessica Giannetti





"The vast majority of women are engaged at their natural business, i.e the raising and improving of families. It is a big job, requiring all their powers. Shall we crowd more on overladen shoulders?" (The Evening Sun, 1 November 1915)

These unbelievable thoughts were a common occurrence in the beginning of the 1900s. Women had yet to secure the right to vote, despite numerous attempts and countless years of effort. "Trust her not; she is fooling thee", "They do not want it", "Not their issue" these are just some of the headlines from *The Evening Sun* in November 1915. Women were thought of as too untrustworthy and uneducated to make such important decisions. In the world we live in today it doesn't always dawn on us that many of the rights and freedoms we embrace were once sought after and yearned for.

2017 marks the 100 year anniversary of women procuring the right to vote in New York. A battle which began way back in the 1800s with events such as the Seneca Falls Convention and activists like Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott. Sadly, both women died before the right they fought so hard for was granted, but their efforts were not disregarded. The beginning of the twentieth century brought about a stronger push for woman suffrage. Several demonstrations, parades and leagues were formed; not all of them women. In 1912, The National Men's League for Woman Suffrage was formed. In 1913, the New York chapter for men was established and Three Village's own Ward Melville joined the fight.

"Supporters of woman's suffrage do not claim for it that it is a universal panacea for all the evils of our government, or that women when they obtain the vote will be less susceptible to temptation than men. We feel that the vote is a right, that no man has a right to set himself upon a pinnacle and cry to women: "So! I am the all-wise, the all-seeing, the all-beneficent creature. To me should be ascribed the willingness and the ability to see and

to accomplish all that is best for you." Who is man that he should do this? Who has said to him that he is by nature the superior and the governor of his mate?" (Ward Melville, The Brooklyn Daily Eagle, 3 July 1913)

The Melville family (Frank, wife Jennie and son Ward) played a large role in the fight for women's rights. They joined organizations, held and attended weekly meetings and even participated in the 1913 Woman Suffrage parade in New York City.

"Frankie and Jane Melville being, young, handsome, & frisky stood in line hours & hours & hours & marched Jane from Washington Sq. to 59" St. Frankie from eleventh St. and Wardie being younger, handsomer (tho that is purely a matter of taste) and friskier mounted a white steed and played Marshall." (Jennie Melville, Personal Notes, 1913)

The Melville Family's involvement did not stop there. They held formal dinners with notable speakers, organized demonstrations, and participated in several rallies including the rally in October 1915, at Carnegie Hall. As

secretary of the Men's League for Woman Suffrage, Ward Melville was instrumental in planning a horseback or motor car hike to Washington to present the New York State petition for woman suffrage to Congress.

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History Close At Hand-Trivia and Local History By Beverly C. Tyler

In searching through old papers and documents I often find an interesting piece of trivia that cannot be developed into an article on local history. I have compiled a few of these bits and pieces and offer them as appetizers for Three Village history.



On the Setauket Village Green you'll find a boulder with a plaque dedicated to Zachariah Hawkins and his wife Mary Biggs who settled in Setauket about 1661. The plaque says that their home was "near this site." The "home lot" of Zachariah was located, "... taking in three rows of apple trees, running to the harbor ..." The actual home site was probably just north of the village green.


The Reverend Zachariah Greene was pastor of the Setauket Presbyterian Church from 1797 to 1850. He took part in the battle of Setauket during the Revolutionary War and participated in the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1826.

In 1850, Rachel Jones, "native Indian" was listed as a member of the Setauket Presbyterian Church at the age of 104. Four other members of the church were over 100 years of age and 18 were more than 90 years old including the retired pastor, the Rev. Zachariah Greene.

History Close At Hand-Local History Trivia Corner By Beverly C. Tyler (Cont. from pg. 4)



On November 24, 1883, the steamer "Florence" built in East Setauket by George E. Hand was completed and left the harbor for Connecticut. The "Florence" and the coal barge "Wilkesbarre" [at left] built by David B. Bayles are the only steam vessels known to have been built in East Setauket.

George Will Hawkins, West Setauket school teacher, told a story of Captain Kidd that he said was passed down from his grandparents, Captain and Mrs. George Hawkins. He said that, "when Captain Kidd needed provisions or a hiding place after some particularly daring raid along the Sound ...he would slip in this creek, haul down his topmast, and he was secure from prying or troublesome Government boats that were looking for him, as his vessel could not be seen from the Sound.



William Sidney Mount spent most of his life in Stony Brook. However, he was born in Setauket, died in East Setauket and is buried in the Setauket Presbyterian Church graveyard. Hawkins Mount House

Margo is the creator of the walking, biking and kayaking tour "Tri-Spy" developed with TVHS. Dominick-Crawford Barn Update



The Three Village Historical Society's "Dominick-Crawford Barn" project is moving along. The barn was built around 1850. Originally located on Old Field Road the barn was donated to TVHS by the Village of Old Field.

The site plan has been submitted to re-purpose the barn to our property in Setauket. We are currently working with the Town of Brookhaven on this project. John Cunniffe is coordinating the process with the town Planning and Building department.

It will be re-purposed into an Educational Resources Center with space allocated for much needed storage for the TVHS. The center will provide expanded space for the society to fulfill its mission to preserve local history, display our artifacts, and to educate the public.

The cement slab for the barn should be poured in the summer/fall of 2017. We are in the process of expediting plans through planning, building, and septic departments. If you would like to donate to this great project contact the Society.

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The Blizzard of 1934 By Karen Martin



Blizzard Ties Up Auto, Rail and Bus Traffic In County Four Deaths Reported Following Snow Storm Schools Close, Mail Deliveries Cease, Commuters Are Unable to Reach City

The blizzard of 1934 was reported, at the time, to be Long Island's worst snow storm since the famous blizzard of 1888. According to the Friday, February 23, 1934 issue of the *Port Jefferson Times-Echo* "Northern Brookhaven township was still struggling today to extricate itself from Monday night's blizzard. Digging their way with shovels through drifts as deep as twelve feet, where huge snow plows and tractors failed to go through, employees of the town highway department have succeeded in making some progress in clearing the main streets in north shore communities."

Even today when a storm is predicted how many of us have experienced a run on bread, milk and eggs? In 1934 with chain stores unable to get supplies from their warehouses it's reported they purchased bread from local

sources and sold it at

inflated prices, milk was at a premium, and stores ran out of shovels. Mail delivery resumed on Wednesday where possible. The paper reports "Women who ventured on the streets attired themselves in men's trousers and availed themselves of the use of hip-boots wherever they could be secured."

With schools closed and transportation nearly impossible, a local medical emergency could not wait. "Suffering severely from an acute appendicitis

operation. The three-mile trip through snow drifts and some untraveled highways was fraught with danger, but was completed successfully. Miss Combs was operated on Tuesday night and her condition is satisfactory," reports the Port Jefferson newspaper.

An article in the March 2 issue of the *Port Jefferson Times-Echo* reports "Blizzard of '34 No Equal for Storm of '88, Setauket Records Reveal." The information on the snowfall was provided by Miss Kate Strong, of Strong's Neck, whose family had operated a weather station there for the US Weather Bureau since 1885. According to Miss Strong's data "The snowfall on the night of Feb. 19 measured 18.3 inches and the fall of the night of the 25th and all day the 26th measured 11.3 inches, making a total of 29.6 inches. In the blizzard of '88 30 inches fell, or 0.4 of an inch more than the present storms. Miss Strong's record also shows that the drifts were 15th. high between their home and the barns and what ordinarily was an easy walk of 5 minutes took half an hour."

Israel G. Hawkins House, Route 25A, Stony Brook By Karen Martin

Along 25A opposite the Stony Brook station tracks, set back on the property fronted by greenhouses, sits the Israel Green Hawkins house. Soon to become the site of the Stony Brook Square, the retail center's design plans to incorporate several of the existing structures including the ca. 1893 house.

If there was any doubt as to the original owner of the home you can find his name in raised lettering on the surrounding granite wall. Israel G. Hawkins was born in Lake Grove on Nov. 2, 1846. He would marry Evelina Bayles (born Sept. 1, 1845) of Stony Brook on Jan. 1, 1872. Settling initially in Lake Grove and then Centereach, they had three daughters Ada, Flora, & Effie. A surveyor by profession, the name Israel G. Hawkins can be found on many property surveys of the time.

Through her family's estate Evelina would acquire significant parcels of land in Stony Brook including the Bayles homestead (her birthplace) in the area of Lubber St. A former schoolteacher and a farmer, Israel also invested in many local business and real estate opportunities. By expanding the property of the Bayles homestead westward to include lands on West Meadow they opened "Pine View House" [below] in 1898 to summer boarders with access to the beach on West Meadow.

In 1893 Israel and Evelina acquired the property on Route 25A and built their Stony Brook home. Evelina would pass away on Dec. 2 1929 at the age of 84. Two

years later, on Christmas Eve 1931, Israel would also pass away. Both are buried in Oak Hill Cemetery in Stony Brook. The home was left to their unmarried daughters Effie and Flora.

In 1937 the daughters sold the property to Jennie F. Melville who, about a month later, sold it Paul Lachenauer. Here



the Lachenauers established the Stony Brook Florist. Along with their daughter Anita and her husband Peter Gustafson the family business operated on the site for many years.

A Casual Witness, published in 1978 by the Museums at Stony Brook (now The Long Island Museum) in cooperation with the Three Village Historical Society, is the story of this family and contains a sampling of some of the 367 family photographs in the collection of the Long Island Museum.
